Fee Increase Reminder

Are your families ready for Child Care Subsidy changes?

Child Care Subsidy (CCS) is increasing from 10 July. Here's what families need to do.

Families who already get CCS

Families already getting CCS don't need to do anything to get the new rates. Services Australia will apply the changes from 10 July.

Families who will become eligible

Families who earn between \$356,756 and \$530,000 may be entitled to CCS from 10 July. Families who haven't claimed CCS, should lodge a claim with Services Australia.

Some families already using care may currently be assessed for CCS and get 0% but will be eligible for an increased rate from 10 July. These families should check that their <u>income estimate</u> is up to date through their <u>Centrelink online</u> account.

Families with more than one child aged 5 or under in care

Families earning below \$362,408 with more than one child aged 5 or under in care can still get a higher rate for their second and younger children from 10 July.

From 10 July, the rates for each child are worked out using two separate income tests. Families can use the CCS Calculator at <u>StartingBlocks.gov.au</u> to find out what their future rates may be.

Families with Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander children

Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander children can get at least 36 hours of subsidised care per fortnight, regardless of their family's circumstances, from 10 July.

If they would like to get at least 36 hours of subsidised care, families can call Services Australia on the <u>Centrelink families line</u> to let them know a child in their care is Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander. It's voluntary to tell Services Australia this.

Families may get more than 36 hours of subsidy per fortnight based on their circumstances and the amount of recognised activity they do. Families will still need to pay the gap fee.

Staying Healthy at Preschool

Throughout the year, staff at Bermagui Preschool follow strict policies and procedures for health and hygiene. We work hard to minimise the chances of cross contamination of germs between children. One of the best measures to prevent cross contamination is effective hand washing. We ask that families encourage their children to wash their hands on arrival and before departing Preschool.



Some of the other measures we use at Bermagui Preschool include:

- > Cleaning and disinfecting bathrooms and play areas twice daily, and toys and equipment on a rotating basis or as required.
- Promoting healthy habits through group discussions, role modelling and activities which include hand washing, correct toileting, nose blowing, covering coughs with elbows and eating at the table.
- Monitoring the children throughout the day to ensure they have support for their health and hygiene needs.
- Asking parents to collect their child from Preschool if they are not well enough to attend and at risk of infecting other children. Parents can help by talking to their children about these procedures at home. Please keep your sick child at home, in consideration of the other children and staff. Also understand that despite our best efforts, children still catch colds and other infections, either at preschool, playgrounds, and supermarkets or from visiting friends etc. However, it is an important process that allows your child to build up anti-bodies that will protect them as they grow older and interact with more people in a larger environment.
- > Teach children to always wash their hands after using the toilet and before eating. This way, the germs on their hands will not enter their mouth with their food.
- > Encourage the children to use the toilet & toilet paper correctly, flush the toilet and then wash and dry their hands.
- > Show children how to blow their nose effectively, and use tissues that can be disposed of (along with the germs).
- > Teach children to catch their cough in their elbow, when coughing.
- > Once your baby is out of the "exploring with the mouth" stage, discourage toys and fingers in their mouth.
- Five lots of praise and encouragement (e.g. "Well done!, stickers, stamps, hugs etc).
- > Using games and songs. Here are some we use at preschool:

This is the way we wash our hands (to the tune of Here we go round the Mulberry Bush)

This is the way we wash our hands, wash our hands, wash our hands.

This is the way we wash our hands before we eat our food.

With a little bit of soap (to the tune of the Birdie Dance Song)

With a little bit of soap and a little bit of water, we wash our hands
After going to the toilet and playing outside, we wash our hands
After playing with our pets and before we eat, we wash our hands
With a little bit of water and a little bit of soap, we wash our hands

Waiting and Taking Turns:

We all use turn taking on a daily basis. Taking turns in conversation, walking through a doorway, during meals, at appointments, while shopping, and even while driving are just some examples of how turn taking occurs day in and day out. While learning to take turns is a part of social emotional development, this can be a real challenge for some children. Throughout a preschool day, children are expected to wait often. This could be while they wait for an educator who is supporting/helping someone else, wait to go to the bathroom, wait during a transition, wait for a toy/resource or wait for a turn in a game. As you can see, taking turns is part of daily life. As children become exposed to more opportunities to practice taking turns, they get better at it and more patient. But when they first start out, taking turns can be frustrating for children, families and teachers alike! At Preschool we use this simple strategy to support children to take turns.

- 1. If a child needs to wait their turn for an adult's attention, the child places their hand silently on the adults arm. At first the adult may need to show the child how to do this.
- 2. The adult then puts their hand over the child's, to acknowledge the child is waiting, while they continue to focus on the first child.
- 3. Once the educator is able to attend/talk to the child they can say thank you for waiting and focus on the child. This way, children will know if they have something to say or need support/help, they will get their chance but they will need to wait their turn.

Policy Update

Services are legally required to ensure families are notified of any changes to policies which affect: the service's provision of education and care to any enrolled child or a family's ability to use the service; fees; or fee collection procedures, 14 days in advance. (Education and Care Services National Regulations 2011). Bermagui Preschool is currently reviewing the Interactions with Families Policy.
